Beginning on February 1st, GBT is now offering a \$5.00 discount every month on your Internet bill if you subscribe to E-Bill and Auto-Pay.

In the past, GBT has offered a one-time credit but has transitioned our program to monthly credit, **saving you \$60.00** a **year** if you enroll in these two programs! If you are already enrolled in Ebill and Autopay, then you automatically will receive the monthly \$5.00 discount!

At GBT, when making decisions and structuring programs, we always have the cooperative at heart and try to do what is going to benefit our members the most. We have been doing this for 70 years and will continue to do this, because we know the decisions we make impact YOU, our amazing customers. Although postage, mailing, stuffing, and bill processing fees have went up, GBT will not charge extra to send a paper bill like so many other companies have. We will just be passing on the savings to our customers that enroll in these programs that help minimize avoidable costs.

The stories we share...

Each individual story of our employee's and customer's experiences with GBT matters. These stories, woven together, make the overall story of GBT and who we are today.

Steve Miller shared a few memories with us from his time on the GBT Board of Directors. He served on the Board from 1983 – 1995 and was President of the Board from 1991-1995.

Steve: "One thing I remember most is when we decided to join Kansas Cellular in 1989 and have cell phones in our area. Bag phones were offered at that time, and they cost \$1200 - \$1300. The very first cellular plans only allowed 15-20 minutes at a reduced rate, and rates went up considerably (45 cents/minute on up), so early on some people woudn't answer calls because it would count against their minutes—they just used their cellular phone for their own business.

GBT had bought 2 new Chevrolet company cars, and the dealer included a free bag phone with them. Our General Manager at the time, Arlyn Solomon, and Office Manager Dan Maltby, would bring the phones in every night and put them in the safe so they wouldn't be stolen from the car!

Another memory is putting our first fiber optic from Rush Center 19 miles south to the Sanford Junction. We only put 6 fibers in the ground because it cost



so much more for each fiber, and we thought 6 fibers would be all we need! (Editor's Note: Today GBT installs 288-count fiber!)

I also can't forget about GBT's 40th Anniversary. It was celebrated by having Eldora Conard of rural Timken cater sandwiches in the warehouse, and we invited the public to come celebrate in Rush Center."

Nominating Process 2023

The Annual Meeting of The Golden Belt Telephone Association, Inc. will be April 19, 2023, at the GBT Corporate Office, Rush Center, Kansas, from 5:00-6:30 p.m.

In accordance with Section 4.4 of the Bylaws of The Golden Belt Telephone Association, Inc., the Board shall appoint a Nominating Committee, who shall be selected from the Districts from which Trustees are to be elected. At least two candidates shall be nominated by the Committee for each district up for election. Any fifteen (15) or more members of a District acting together may make other nominations by petition, and the Secretary shall post such nominations at the same place where the list of nominations made by the committee is posted.

The following Districts will be up for election: District 2 – Ellis, McCracken; District 4 – Alexander, Bazine, Rush Center.

Tell us about your job...



Do you remember the ice/snow storm of March 1957? Not only was it a benchmark to compare recent storms to in terms of ferocity and widespread impact, but it was a pivotal time in GBT history as it leveled over 800 telephone poles, therefore making no telephone in the system work. Thankfully, GBT rallied together and with the help of local labor the systems were quickly rebuilt. Terry Keenan, Ness City, KS wrote to weather.gov: "I was twelve years old at the time, living on a farm northeast of Seward, Kansas in Stafford county. After the rain and sleet hit, putting ice on everything, the wind and snow lasted for over two days. Our electricity was off over six weeks since every power pole in the area had been snapped. My older brother had a summertime job from college putting them back. After the storm was over, you could not go anywhere. Phone lines were down, no tv, no transistor radios. My dad asked me to saddle our horse and ride into Seward, two miles as the crow flies. To my amazement, the horse went thru the tall drifts without any trouble. I arrived in town, picked up our mail and left with news for the family. We did not have school for two weeks. Since we had milk cows, chickens, windmill water, things could have been worse. We played ten point pitch most nights to a coal-lamp."

Game of the Month:

Galuskies (Stuffed Cabbage)



Galuskies, stuffed cabbage, pigs in a blanket, cabbage rolls... if you come from a German background you may have a different name for them, but no matter what you call them at the end of the day, these stuffed cabbage rolls are hard to beat!

Ingredients

3 heads cabbage, cored

1/4 cup diced onion

1 cup apple cider vinegar

4 teaspoons salt

3 cups water

11/2 teaspoons garlic salt

11/2 cups long grain rice

1 teaspoon fresh-ground black pepper

5 pounds ground beef

pork sausage

1 (16 ounce) jar sauerkraut,

1 (16 ounce) package bulk

drained and pureed

Instructions

Step 1: Place cabbages in a large stockpot filled halfway with water; add vinegar. Cover and steam over low heat until leaves are tender, 1 to 11/2 hours. Remove cabbages, reserving vinegar cooking water. Rinse with cold water to chill the cabbage, then separate the leaves.

Step 2: Meanwhile, bring 3 cups water and rice to a boil in a saucepan over high heat. then reduce heat to low, cover, and simmer until the rice is tender, about 20 minutes. Remove from heat and fluff with a fork; set aside to cool.

Step 3: Heat a large skillet over medium heat. Brown the ground beef and sausage with the onion, salt, garlic salt, and pepper, 7 to 10 minutes. Drain and set aside to

Step 4: Preheat oven to 325 degrees F (165 degrees C). Cover the bottom of a large roasting pan with a single layer of cabbage leaves.

Step 5: Prepare the filling by stirring together the rice, cooked meat, and sauerkraut until well blended. Place 1/3 cup of filling into each leaf and roll into a cylinder, tucking in the ends as you roll it up. Place the rolls into the roasting pan. Pour in enough of the cooking liquid from the cabbage to come halfway up the sides of the rolls. Cover pan with a tight fitting lid or aluminum foil.

Step 6: Bake in preheated oven for 11/2 hours. Serve warm or at room temperature.
